3rd Quarter 2023 Issue

This issue shows that the effects of inflation have been somewhat dying down as the values of exports and severance tax collections have been falling. However, the weights of the exports out of the Calcasieu Ship Channel have remained high. The remaining variables show slow and steady growth throughout all the parishes which will hopefully continue throughout the year. Interesting developments in the SNAP program show that while the amount of benefits has fallen due to the expiration of emergency increases, the amount of households and beneficiaries has remained fairly steady. Gaming and tax collections remain strong but have come down slightly. Finally, employment has been growing over the past two quarters in the MSA and most parishes have seen slight increases in their employment figures.

The final piece of this report contains a piece written by guest columnist Gus Fontenot. Having attractive sites for businesses to locate and construct facilities on is crucial to economic development. Developers and site selectors want to know their location will have adequate infrastructure, transportation access, labor availability, etc. Gus serves as the Director of Site Development at the SWLA Economic Development Alliance. In the final essay, he discusses the importance of sites, the state's Certified Sites Program, and what is available in our economic region.




In the 3rd quarter of 2023, the Lake Charles MSA (consisting of Calcasieu and Cameron parishes) experienced a general overall increase in employment compared to the same quarter the previous year. After benchmark revisions, there have been drops almost every quarter, but the jobs have been ticking up.

Total nonfarm employment (presented in thousands of jobs in the table) grew by 2,800 jobs over the year for a 3.0% increase. Looking at the industries, most had increases or no change while Trade, Transportation, and Utilities, had the largest decline of 200 jobs (-1.4%). Leisure and Hospitality experienced the largest industry gain of 800 workers (+6.6%), followed by Construction with an increase of 700 workers. (+5.9%). Professional and Business Services saw a 200 worker increase (+1.8%), Mining and

Logging had an increase of 100 jobs (+33.3%), and Government increased by 300 (+2.5%).

While there was a gain in employment, there were also increases in earnings measures. The average weekly earnings of all employees rose 18.9% and average hourly earnings rose 11.8%. Although not shown, average weekly hours of all employees in the 3rd quarter rose 6.3% over the year. Some of these dramatic increases are partly due to inflation.









The quarterly average unemployment rate in the MSA currently sits at 3.1% which represents a 0.6 percentage point drop from a year ago. The household employment measure grew by 851 over the year for a 0.9% increase. The number of unemployed decreased by 601. This represented a 17% decrease. As the labor force is the total of unemployed and employed, the total change in the labor force was an increase of 250 (0.3%). More labor will be needed for long-term growth so future developments in this measure should be watched closely.

Job openings in the 3rd quarter of 2023 averaged 5,248. Openings decreased by 1,895 (-26.5%) over the year.








As housing prices have been rising dramatically in recent years, they have flattened and the prices in the area were rising slower than the state and the nation. Price increases have certainly slowed. Looking at price changes over-the-year, from the 2nd quarter of 2022 to the same quarter in 2023, housing prices have risen 0.9% in the Lake Charles MSA compared to 1.1% in LA and 4.5% in the US.

In the 3rd quarter of 2023, single unit permits fell by 77 over-the-year while multi-unit permits had an increase of 106, therefore the total increase was 29. This represented a 14.3% increase. The YTD figures show some different results with a decrease in single units of 286 and multi-unit permits decreasing by 42 for a total drop of 286 over the year in the third quarter. The total percentage decrease in YTD was 30.2%. In terms of valuation, single unit permits fell by \$9.8 million while multi-unit permit valuations rose by \$21.6 million for a total increase of \$11.8 million. This represented a 30.1% increase year-over-year in the 3rd quarter of 2023 for valuation of all permits. In terms of YTD numbers, there was a total decrease of 14.6% and multiunits saw a 42.4% change in valuation YTD.


The graph of building permits shows that single unit permits fell from the 4th quarter of 2022 to the 3rd quarter of 2023 while multi-unit permits rose. Since the 1st quarter of 2023 saw a drop in multi-unit permits, the blue line representing the total of single and multi-unit shows a large drop in the 1st quarter of 2023 while the overall trend of the line is relatively flat but remains high.




The Lake Charles regional airport experienced a great uptick in activity during the 2nd quarter of 2023 compared to the same quarter the previous year. Activity has increased during 2023 as the airport and area recover from the storms and flights have resumed out of LCH.

Passengers departing in the 2nd quarter of 2023 rose 4,912 (+30.7%) since the 2nd quarter of 2022 and those arriving have increased 4,674 (+30.1%). In terms of flights, there has been an increase of 31 flights (+6.9%) departing Lake Charles over that same period while the number

of flights arriving has risen by 25 (+5.6%). The graphs showing these measures point to an upward trend after starting at low levels in 2020 due to the storms and COVID. Flights and passengers have been steadily increasing since that time. Hopefully, the strong performance in the 2nd quarter is a sign of more permanent things to come.

Lake Charles Port Statistics




The Lake Charles port has seen some decreases in exports and increases in import values in the 3rd quarter of 2023. The figures in the table below show the value of exports fell \$3.9 billion (-50.2%) over the year while the total value of imports rose \$143 million (+57.2%) The total weight of all exports fell 438 million kg (-5.2%) while the total weight of all imports rose 467 million kg (+101.2%). While values have fallen (due to falling energy prices), total weight has been

In terms of revenues, gaming establishments have rebounded from the pandemic and hurricanes and the Horseshoe has been open for three full quarters. Revenues in SWLA were about 1.6% lower than 3rd quarter of 2022 and statewide AGR in 2023 was 1.6% less than Q3 2022. We will need to wait for year-overyear comparisons with the Horseshoe open. Total revenues in SWLA for the 3rd quarter of 2023 were \$217.7 million, or a 1.6% percent decrease from the previous year.

The Horseshoe collected \$21.9 million in revenue in the 3rd quarter of 2023. L 'Auberge had a decrease of \$10.5 million for a 12% decrease. The Golden Nugget had an annual percentage drop in AGR of 13.1% with an absolute decrease of \$11.8 million. Delta Downs experienced a \$3.2 million decrease in AGR over the year for a 7.5% decrease. These figures still


indicate a solid recovery in the gaming market from 2020, however, things have been slowing in terms of Q3 yearover-year changes. This may be due to people making less frequent visits due to higher transportation costs (gasoline prices) and more spending on other goods due to inflation. Also, some of the increased activity at the Horseshoe may be eating into nearby casino AGR. The three SWLA establishments made up 43.5% of the total AGR from riverboats and slots and tracks in the state, which is essentially the same as the 43.6% in the 3rd quarter of 2022.



In the 3^{rd} quarter of 2023, Allen parish saw a rise in the labor force of 50 (+0.6%). This was broken down by an increase in household unemployment of 98 over the year (+1.3%) while the number of employed persons fell 48 (-13%) over the year. The unemployment rate fell over the year by six percentage points to 3.9%

Job openings in the 3rd quarter of 2023 averaged 235. Openings fell by 67 (-22.3%) over the year.


The graphs show the levels of household employment, unemployment, and the unemployment rate for each quarter compared to the same quarter the previous two

years. In the 3rd quarter of 2023, Allen has had slightly higher employment compared to previous year levels and lower unemployment levels compared to previous years.






The graph to the left shows the number of new business filings each quarter compared to the same quarter in the previous two years.

The number of new business filings in Allen parish was 46 in the 3rd quarter of 2023 which was 1 more than the same quarter in 2022 and 1 more compared to the same quarter 2 years ago. The YTD total for the 3rd quarter of 2023 was 117. This was 17 businesses less than the 3rd quarter of 2022 YTD and 2 businesses less than the 3rd quarter of 2021 YTD.

Allen parish had a decrease in SNAP recipients and an increase in households, along with a decrease in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 4,426 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 3rd quarter of 2023. 138 fewer people received benefits compared to the 3rd quarter of 2022 for a 3% decrease over this time. The total number of third quarter households receiving SNAP was 2,130, which was 134 more than the same quarter in the previous year. This represented a 6.7% increase. In terms of benefits, the parish received \$732,265 in total during the 3rd quarter of 2023, which was a \$275 thousand decrease over-the-year. This was a 27.3% decrease in benefits in the parish. March

marked a large drop in total benefits to bring down the whole of quarter 1 due to emergency benefits expiring and that showed up markedly in the 2nd and 3rd quarters. This lower level should be persistent in future quarters.







Tax Collections

The Drew CBEA has built a history of Allen Parish sales tax collections with the help of the Allen Parish School Board. The numbers show an upward trend throughout the 3rd quarter of 2023.

Compared to the 3rd quarter of 2022, Allen parish has seen an overall increase in tax collections. Total tax collections increased \$930.6 thousand for a 19.4% increase. This is mostly likely due to the recent inflation the nation has been experiencing as a recent 1 percentage point increase in the local sales tax rate that has been normalized.




In the 3rd quarter of 2023, Beauregard parish saw a drop in household employment of 183 over the year (-1.3%) while


the number of unemployed persons fell by 46 (-8.8%) over the year. This led to a decrease of 229 (-1.5%) in the total labor force. The unemployment rate fell by 0.2 percentage points over the year to 3.3%.

Job openings in the 3rd quarter averaged 397. Openings fell by 173 (-30.3%) over the year.



The graph shows the amount of new business filings each quarter compared to the same quarter in the previous two years.



Beauregard parish has experienced increases in SNAP recipients, households and drops in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 5,935 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 3rd quarter of 2023. 329 more people received benefits compared to the 3rd quarter of 2022 for a 5.9% increase over this time. The total number of households receiving SNAP averaged 2,732, which was 206 more than the same quarter in the previous year. This represented




an 8.2% increase. In terms of benefits, the parish received an average of \$1 million in total during the 3rd quarter of 2023, which was a \$307.4 thousand decrease over-the-year. This was a 23.5% decrease in benefits in the parish.

Looking at the graph illustrates a slightly increasing trend in benefits, households, and recipients, over the past two years. The later trends seem to show all the variables slightly falling throughout 2023. March marked a large drop in total benefits to bring down the whole of quarter 1 due to emergency benefits expiring, and that will show in future quarters.




Tax Collections



Beauregard parish has seen an overall decrease in its sales tax collections in the 3rd quarter of 2023, compared to the same quarter the previous year. Sales tax collections rose by \$1.7 million over the year for a 17.5% increase. Looking at the entities that receive sales tax distributions shows that DeRidder collects the most revenue, but other areas are close. The DeRidder category saw a notable year-over-year increase of \$360.2 thousand (+16.1%) over the year.The largest increase came from the Police Jury, with an absolute rise of \$410.4 thousand, or a 20.6% increase. School board revenues rose by roughly \$358.8 thousand

(+17.8%) and \$371.3 thousand (+18.8) for All and NM, respectively. BPSO collections rose by \$171.3 thousand (+16.8%) and PJ Courthouse collections rose \$90.5 thousand (+18%). Merryville tax collections saw a decline in sales taxes of \$31.4 thousand, with the largest notable decrease in percent change over the year of 21.1%.


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

In the 3rd quarter of 2023, Calcasieu parish saw an increase in the labor force of 236 (+0.3%). This was due to an increase in household employment of 818 over the year (+0.9%) while the number of unemployed people fell by 582 (-16.9%). The unemployment rate fell 0.7 percentage points over the year to 3.1%.





Taxable sales in Calcasieu parish have flattened out after the major upticks following the storms. This flattening has occurred even with inflation.

Collections experienced a large uptick in the 2nd


quarter of 2023 due to a settlement. Looking at the 3rd quarter, compared to the same quarter the previous year, sales tax collections, plus occupancy, have risen by \$4.1 million over the year for a 3.9% increase. General sales taxes rose by \$4.1 million (+4.1%) over the year. Occupancy taxes decreased. These taxes fell by \$100 thousand for a 2.7% decrease. This occurred as total taxable sales in the parish rose \$79.8 million (+4.4%) over the year. Manufactruing rose the largest in absolute terms (+\$45.2 million, +12.7%). Miscellaneous rose the most in percentage terms (+31.5%). Miscellaneous services also increased \$20.4 million (+13.9%). Merchandise(+0.2%), Restaurants (+4.1%), Motor Vehicles (+4.4%), Restaurants (+4.1%), Automotive and gas (+16.3%), and Gaming (+5.2%), all had increases. Food (-0.2%). Apparel (-0.5%), Furniture (-10.6%), Utilities (-0.8%), fell along with Building materials (-6.6%). However, these categories are recovering with much higher levels that were seen during COVID and storm recovery.



Calcasieu parish has had increases in SNAP recipients, households, and a drop in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 33,299 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 3rd quarter of 2023. This was 3,404 more people receiving benefits compared to the 3rd quarter of 2022 for a 11.4% increase over this time. The total number of households receiving SNAP averaged 15,666 which was 1,834 higher than the same quarter in the previous year. This represented a 13.3% increase. In terms of benefits, the parish received an average of \$5.9 million in total during the 3rd quarter of 2023, which was a \$1.4 million decrease over-the-year. This was an 19.4% decrease in benefits in the







In the 3rd quarter of 2023, Cameron parish had an increase in household employment of 33 over the year (+1.0%) while the number of unemployed persons fell by 19 (-18.9%). This meant an increase of 14 (+0.4%) in the total labor force. The unemployment rate fell 0.5 percentage points over the year to 2.4%.

Job openings in the 3rd quarter of 2023 averaged 177. Openings rose by 100 (+128.9%) over the year.

falling labor force throughout 2022 but have had increases the last two quarters.










Tax Collections

Cameron parish collects no local sales tax, so it is not possible to show the monthly or quarterly trends in those particular tax collections in the parish. However, Cameron is the parish in SWLA that is generally responsible for the highest amount of state severance tax collections. In order to give some view into the severance tax collections in the parish, below are figures and data relating to the recent severance tax collections by category for Cameron.



The largest amount of severance tax collections from Cameron are taxes on oil. Oil tax collections in the 3rd quarter of 2023 actually fell by \$858.7 thousand compared to the same quarter the previous year. This represented a 29.9% decrease as oil prices have recently decreased and production picked up from the pandemic. In terms of gas collections, those rose \$49.9 thousand over that period for a 21% increase. Timber product collections were \$38 in the 3rd quarter, The 3rd quarter of 2023 saw some increases in gas severance taxes collected while the biggest component continued its declines.

The YTD figures show in 2023 there was a decline in 3rd quarter total severance taxes collected compared to the same quarter in the previous year. In the 3rd quarter 2023 YTD, severance taxes fell \$516.7 thousand for a decrease of 5.8%. As mentioned previously, much of this can be traced to the drop in oil prices compared to the 3rd quarter of 2022.







Cameron parish has had drops in SNAP recipients and households, and benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 328 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 2nd quarter of 2023. This was 29 fewer people receiving benefits compared to the 2nd quarter of 2022 for an 8.2% decrease over this time. The total number of households receiving SNAP averaged 141 which was 25 less than the same quarter in the previous year. This represented a 15% decrease. The parish received an average of \$111.8 thousand in total during the 2nd quarter of 2023, which was a \$9.19 thousand decrease overthe-year. This was a 7.5% decrease in benefits in the parish. Looking at the graph illustrates

recipients, households, and benefits falling throughout 2021 and 2022. Part of this falling participation is most likely due to population loss from the storms. Benefits have risen recently due to adjustments in the amounts, but the overall trends are declines in since 2021 until the recent spike. March marked a large drop in total benefits to bring down the whole of quarter 1 due to emergency benefits expiring, and that will show in future quarters.






Jeff Davis Parish Unemployment







Jefferson Davis Parish saw a 9.2% increase in its sales tax collections in the 3rd quarter of 2023, compared to the same quarter the previous year. Sales tax collections have risen by approximately \$800 thousand over the year for a 9.2% increase. This occurred as taxable sales in the parish rose by \$15.2 million (+7.2%) over the year. The largest percentange increase occurred in Oil & Gas (+\$3.0 million, +186.3%) followed by Transportation (+2.8 million, +135.8%). Lumber experienced the largest absolute increase in taxable sales (+\$6.1 million, +57.5%). Auto (+\$2.6 million, +6.5%), Miscellaneous Services (+\$3.4 million, +40.6%), General Merchandies (+\$1.2 million, +2.3%), Manufacturing (+\$0.2 million, +9.5%), Lease/Rental (+\$0.5 million, +24.9%), Occupancy (+\$0.1 million, +7.4%), and Entertainment (+\$0.0 million, +0.3%) also had increases in sales. The largest percentage drops occurred in Furniture (-\$0.4 million, -17.8%), Apparel (-\$0.2 million, -10.9%), and Utilities (-\$0.2 million, -6.4%). The largest absolute drop occurred in Auto (-\$1.0 million, -2.3%). Food was the other category that had a drop in sales over the year (-\$0.4 million, -1.2%).

The 3rd quarter of 2023 YTD figures show that total taxable sales have increased in the parish by \$34.4 million compared to the same quarter in 2022 for a 7.1% increase. There was a \$1.6 million increase in 2023 YTD sales tax collections (+6.5%).




Economic Development is a broad subject that encompasses many disciplines. It's why the umbrella is an appropriate logo for the Southwest Louisiana Economic Development Alliance. Under the umbrella of economic development are efforts involving workforce development, retail recruitment, quality of life initiatives, educational support, marketing and promotion, and other advocacy efforts. Another aspect of economic development is site development.

When trying to attract business and industry to our region, it requires many of the components already mentioned to align and work together. Site readiness is an essential strategy of economic development. The Alliance works to identify and cultivate sites across the region that could potentially land industrial operations that are looking for a home.

Having industrial sites available and prepared for development offers businesses a faster speed to market, which could impact the investor's bottom line. A healthy portfolio of shovel-ready sites also helps us compete against other regions vying for the same target industries, whether that be warehousing and distribution, heavy industry, light industry, or other types of manufacturing and production. As the old saying goes, "Time is money." The faster a business can find a site and hit the ground running on a site, the better it is for business.

Good sites require a long checklist of features that make them ideal opportunities. Most important is supporting infrastructure. Does the site have adequate water and sewer service? What about access and proximity to good highways? Is the site rail served or accessible by ships or barges? Is it close to sources of input such as natural gas, electricity, pipeline corridors, or other required feedstocks?



In addition to good infrastructure, other factors could determine whether the site is ripe for development. In Southwest Louisiana, common obstacles to development include the presence of extensive wetlands, or being in the 100- or 500-year flood zone. Other deterrents could arise from legacy environmental contamination, proximity to residential areas, lack of proper zoning, or poor geologic conditions that would make it difficult to build certain structures.


The perfect site rarely exists. The Alliance's goal, after identifying a potential site, is to see if it can be made better, and thus, more competitive in the marketplace. There are programs accessible through The Alliance that help manage this.

The Louisiana Certified Sites program is one way for private landowners to obtain due diligence on their property, with the goal of getting the property into industrial commerce. The due diligence produced under this program, managed by Louisiana Economic Development (LED), includes studies such as a wetland delineation, a geotechnical soil report, an environmental assessment, and many other investigations and data-gathering efforts.

Having this due diligence on file in advance of interest in a site will help that site be more attractive to potential investors. Certification provides faster speed to market for a site, and identifies any potential issues that might hinder a site's ability to be developed. Threats to quick development include the presence of endangered species, cultural artifacts, contamination, or lack of supporting infrastructure. If obstacles exist, the certification program works to find remedies to those problems so that there are few unknowns that remain about a site that a developer might unexpectedly encounter.



LED's Certified Sites program provides this due diligence to the landowner at just a 25% cost-share, with the State covering the remaining 75% of costs. It's a great deal for landowners looking to develop their property for industrial use, and beneficial to the region by enhancing our industrial site inventory. Today, Southwest Louisiana has 10 LED Certified Sites across its five-parish territory, with additional sites pending certification. Statewide, there are more than 100 LED certified sites.



Another tool for site development is the newly created Louisiana Competes program. This is a program funded by recent legislation that pays to have publicly owned sites improved for economic development purposes. Such improvements range anywhere from improved lighting, pavement, utility construction, landscaping or clearing, wetland mitigation, and many other upgrades.

The Louisiana Competes program only requires a 10% match from the public landowner for a project, with 90% being covered by the State. This was the first year the program has rolled out, and Southwest Louisiana has already submitted applications for improvements on public properties located in Beauregard, Calcasieu, and Jeff Davis parishes. Further opportunities are also being explored in Cameron and Allen parishes, too, through either police juries, ports, airports, or other public property owners.

Finding a good site isn't just a challenge for investors. It is a challenge for successful economic development. Any property owner that would like to see industrial development on their property should contact The Alliance

for an evaluation of their site. The Alliance will help explore opportunities for development, either through siteimprovement efforts or by marketing and promoting the site. But, we need the help and cooperation of landowners to find such properties.
