## 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 2025 Issue

This 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 2025 issue points out the economic has been sort of a mixed bag. The MSA has seen slight increases in total nonfarm employment, but the parishes have seen drops in household employment job openings. Tax revenues have generally been increasing while other variables have been flat, showing very little change. SNAP benefits have decreased somewhat dramatically in parishes.

The final piece shows highlights from the latest State of SWLA breakfast that was presented by the SWLA Economic Development Alliance at the Horseshoe Casino this year. It was a great event showcasing all the great developments at the regional and state level. While the coincident economic index for the region has been flat, there have been large increases in multi-unit permits in the previous year which should result in more building in the current and coming years. The statistical forecasts for jobs of the area point to continued flat trends but incorporating recent FIDs in the area greatly increase the trajectory over the next two years.

In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, the Lake Charles MSA (consisting of Calcasieu and Cameron parishes) experienced an increase in outcome compared to the same quarter the previous year. After benchmark revisions, there have been drops almost every quarter, but the jobs have been continuing to tick upwards.

Total nonfarm employment (presented in thousands of jobs in the table) saw 0.9% growth over the year. Looking at the industries, most had increases or no change while Construction had the largest decline of 900 jobs (-7.6%). Leisure and Hospitality saw an increase of 700 jobs (+5.3%). Education and Health Services saw an increase of 500 jobs (+3.5%). Trade, Transportation, and Utilities experienced a slight industry gain of 200 workers (+0.9%). Government also increased 200 jobs (+1.4%). Professional and Business Services, Mining and Logging, and Information all saw no real change in workers. Manufacturing and Other Services both saw a slight increase of 100 workers. Financial Activities (-1.8%) had a decrease of 100 jobs.

While there was a gain in employment, there were also increases in earnings measured. The average weekly earnings of all employees rose 6.5% and average hourly earnings

rose 4.9%. The average weekly hours of all employees in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter rose 1.5% over the year.









The quarterly average unemployment rate in the MSA currently sits at 4.7%, which represents a 0.5 percentage point increase from a year ago. The household employment measure decreased by 483 over the year for a 0.5% decrease. The number of unemployed increased by 532. This represented a 12.9% increase. As the labor force is the total of unemployed and employed, the total change in the labor force was an increase of 5,935 (+6.4%). More labor will be needed for long-term growth so future developments in this measure should be watched closely.


Job openings in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 averaged 4,027.

Openings decreased by 645 (-13.8%) over the year.

Jobs have been increasing but are still below pre-pandemic levels. Fortunately, the area is above pre-Laura levels.





As housing prices have been rising dramatically in recent years, they have flattened and the prices in the area were falling while there were slower increases in the state and the nation. Looking at price changes over-the-year, from the first quarter of 2025 to the same quarter in 2024, housing prices have fallen 4.6% in the Lake Charles MSA compared to increases of 2.1% in LA and 5.4% in the US.

#### Housing Permits - Lake Charles MSA



In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, single unit permits fell by 53 over-the-year while multi-unit permits had a decrease of 92, therefore the total decrease was 145. This represented a 46.2% decrease. The YTD figures show similar results with a decrease in single units of 86 and multi-unit permits decreasing by 208 for a total decrease of 294 over the year in the second quarter. The total percentage decrease in YTD was 48.8%. In terms of valuation, single unit permits fell by \$10.8 million while multi-unit permit valuations fell by \$21 million for a total decrease of \$31.9 million. This represented a 47.5% decrease year-over-year in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 for the valuation of all permits. In terms of YTD numbers, single unit valuations decreased

\$15.6 million and multi-unit valuations decreased \$44 million for a total percentage change of -47.2%.

The graph of building permits shows that single-unit permits have been decreasing since the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2024 after spiking. Multi-unit permits were 0 in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2025. The blue line shows the total permits, and it has displayed a downward flat trend since 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2024.





#### **Lake Charles Regional Airport**






The Lake Charles regional airport experienced a downtick in activity during the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2025 compared to the same quarter of the previous year. Activity has decreased compared to the start of 2024 but overall is still increasing as the airport and area recover from the storms and flights have resumed out of LCH.



Passengers departing in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2025 fell 1,024 (-5.1%) since the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2024 and those arriving have decreased 776 (-4.0%). In terms of flights, there has been a decrease of 26 flights (-5.8%) departing from Lake Charles over that same period while the number of

flights arriving has fallen by 17 (-3.9%) as well. The number of passengers has been steadily increasing since 2020.

#### **Lake Charles Port Statistics**





The Lake Charles port has seen decreases in export values and a decrease in import values in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025. The figures in the table below show the value of exports fell \$279 million (-7.9%) over the year while the total value of imports fell by \$265 million (-51.4%) The total weight of all exports fell 57 million kg (-0.7%) while the total weight of all imports fell 333 million kg (-32.7%). Export values have recently been rising, but total weights have been



In terms of revenues, gaming establishments have rebounded from the pandemic and hurricanes, and the Horseshoe has now been open for year-over-year comparisons. Revenues in SWLA were about 2.2% higher than the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024 and statewide AGR in Q2 2025 was 7.9% lower than Q2 2024. Total revenues in SWLA for the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 were \$229.1 million, or a 2.2% percent increase from the previous year.

Horseshoe collected \$26.2 million in revenue in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 (+20.7%). L'Auberge saw a \$2.5 million increase (+3.2%). The Golden Nugget had an annual percentage decrease in AGR of 4.5% with an absolute decrease of \$3.7 million. Delta Downs experienced a \$1.6 million increase in AGR over the year for a 3.9% increase. These figures still indicate a solid recovery in the gaming market from 2020;

however, things had been slowing in terms year-over-year changes until this recent quarter. The four SWLA establishments made up 46.8% of the total AGR from riverboats and slots and tracks in the state, which is a 4.6 percentage point increase from the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024.











In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, Allen parish saw a rise in the labor force of 22 (+0.3%). This was broken down by an increase in household unemployment of 25 over the year (+6.5%) while the number of employed people fell by 2 (0.0%) over the year. The unemployment rate rose over the year by 0.3 percentage points to 5.0%.

Job openings in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 averaged 158. Openings fell by 63 (-28.4%) over the year.

The graphs show the levels of household employment, unemployment, and the unemployment rate for each quarter compared to the same quarter the previous two




years. In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, Allen has had slightly lower employment compared to previous year's levels and slightly higher unemployment levels compared to previous years.

The graph to the left shows the number of new business filings each quarter compared to the same quarter in the previous two years.


The number of new business filings in Allen parish was 36 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 which was the same as the second quarter in 2024 and 3 less than the same quarter 2 years ago. The YTD total for the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 was 66. This was 9 businesses less than the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024 YTD and 5 businesses fewer than the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2023 YTD.

Allen parish had a decrease in SNAP recipients and in households, along with a decrease in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 4,024 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025. 161 fewer people received benefits compared to the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024 for a 3.8% decrease over this time. The total number of second quarter households receiving SNAP was 1,973, which was 36 less than the same quarter in the previous year. This represented a 1.8% decrease. In terms of benefits, the parish received \$667,183 in total during the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, which was a \$23,007 decrease over-the-year. This was a 3.3% decrease in benefits in the parish. March 2023 marked a large

drop in total benefits to bring down the whole of quarter 1 due to emergency benefits expiring and that showed up markedly in the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> quarters. This lower level should be persistent in future quarters, as has begun to show in the graph.






#### **Tax Collections**

The Drew CBEA has built a history of Allen Parish sales tax collections with the help of the Allen Parish School Board. The numbers show an upward trend throughout the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024.

Compared to the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024, Allen Parish has seen an overall increase in tax collections. Total tax collections increased \$817.5 thousand for a 15.7% increase.




In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, Beauregard parish saw a fall in household employment of 543 over the year (-3.8%) while


the number of unemployed people rose by 83 (+15.3%) over the year. This led to a decrease of 460 (-3.1%) in the total labor force. The unemployment rate rose by 0.7 percentage points over the year to 4.4%.

Job openings in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter averaged 260. Openings fell by 89 (-25.4%) over the year.





Beauregard parish has experienced increases in SNAP recipients and households and drops in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 5,833 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025. 30 more people received benefits compared to the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2024 for a 0.5% increase over this time. 

Looking at the graph illustrates relative flat trends in benefits, households, and recipients, over the past two years. Benefit amounts have been up and down, but the trend remains flat.






#### **Tax Collections**



Beauregard parish has seen an overall decrease in its sales tax collections in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, compared to the same quarter the previous year. Sales tax collections fell by \$1.97 million over the year for a 13.9% decrease. Looking at the entities that receive sales tax distributions shows that Police Jury collects the most revenue, but other areas are close. The Police Jury category saw a \$1.05 million decrease (-28.0%). DeRidder saw a notable year-over-year increase of \$238 thousand (+10.4%) over the year. Another increase came from Merryville, which increased \$5.1 thousand, or a 4.1% increase. All School board

revenues fell by roughly \$419.8 thousand (-14.4%). BPSO collections fell by \$221.1 thousand (-15.1%) and PJ Courthouse fell \$104.7 thousand (-14.4%). School NM tax collections saw a decrease in sales taxes of \$419.1 thousand, marking a 14.5% decrease.

Taxable sales in Calcasieu parish have seeemd to be more volatile over the past two years with more spikes and drops when looking at the data on a quarterly basis.

Collections experienced an increase in the 2<sup>nd</sup>

quarter of 2025. Looking at the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, compared to the same quarter the previous year, sales tax collections, plus occupancy, have risen by \$5.3 million over the year for a 4.8% increase. General sales taxes rose by \$5.2 million (+4.8%) over the year. Occupancy taxes didn't have a significant change. These taxes rose \$0.1 million for a 6.4% increase year over year. This occurred as total taxable sales in the parish rose \$31.3 million (+1.6%) over the year. Merchandise rose the largest in absolute terms (+\$23.9 million, +6.3%). While Building Materials rose the largest in percentage points (+\$18.6 million, +11.2%). Utility fell the largest in absolute terms and percentage points (-\$10.3 million, -21.0%). Misc. fell in percentage terms (-15.3%) and Furniture fell (-9.3%). Food (+0.9%), Apparel (+10.7%), Automotive & Gas (+4.4%), M.V. (+7.3%), and Restaurants (+6.5%) all experienced increases in collections. While Gaming decreased (-3.9%), Manufacturing decreased (-2.5%), and Misc. Services decreased (-0.9%).





Calcasieu parish has had decreases in SNAP recipients and increases in households, along with an increase in benefits over the year. The parish had an average of 33,250 recipients of SNAP benefits in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025. 







#### **Tax Collections**

However, Cameron is the parish in SWLA that is generally responsible for the highest amount of state severance tax collections. To give some view into the severance tax collections in the parish, below are figures and data relating to the recent severance tax collections by category for Cameron.


The largest amount of severance tax collections from Cameron are taxes on oil. Oil tax collections in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 fell by \$678.1 thousand compared to the same quarter the previous year. This represented a 30.0% decrease. In terms of gas collections, those fell \$141.4 thousand over that period for a 40.1% decrease. Timber product collections were \$11 thousand in the 2nd quarter, a 447.6% increase. The 2nd quarter of 2025 saw some decreases in gas severance taxes collected while the biggest component continued its decline.

The YTD figures show that in 2025 there was a decline in 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter total severance taxes collected compared to the same quarter in the previous year. In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 YTD, severance taxes fell \$1.58 million for a decrease of 30.3%.



Jefferson Davis Parish saw a 5.0% increase in its sales tax collections in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025, compared to the same quarter the previous year. Sales tax collections have risen by approximately \$400 thousand over the year. This occurred as taxable sales in the parish rose by \$10.2 million (+6.2%) over the year. The largest percentange increase occurred in Manufacturing (+\$1.5 million, +91.9%), followed by Apparel (+\$0.3 million, +21.5%). Food experienced an increase in taxable sales (+\$1.1 million, +3.9%) as did General Merch (+\$2.6 million, +4.7%), Auto (+\$4.6 million, 11.6%), Misc. Serv. (+\$0.9 million, +8.2%), Utilities (+\$0.4 million, +13.5%), Lease/Rental (+\$0.2 million, +6.3%), Transportation (+\$0.2 million, +9.1%), and Entertainment (+\$0.1 million, +15.9%). Oil & Gas had the largest decrease in absolute terms and percentage (-\$0.9 million, -25.8%). While additional drops occurred in Furniture (-\$0.2 million, -13.5%), Lumber, Building, Contractors (-\$0.6 million, -5.4%), and Occupancy (-\$0.1 million, -6.3%).

The 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2025 YTD figures show that total taxable sales have increased in the parish by \$9.2 million compared to the same quarter in 2024 for a 2.8% increase. There was a \$0.3 million increase in 2025 YTD sales tax collections (+1.7%).




## State of SWLA - Recap


#### Lake Charles MSA Bouncing Back, Seeing Positive Signs of Economic Growth

At the recent State of Southwest Louisiana breakfast event, McNeese State University, the Alliance, and LED all came together to show the bright economic transformation that is coming to the state and region. Dr. Daniel Groft presented a comprehensive economic outlook, highlighting both national and local trends, emphasizing long-term and year-over-year trends across key indicators. Nationally, the economy has shown steady growth in output since 2020 and employment remains strong, though growth is stabilizing, while inflation appears to be easing. In Louisiana, employment has finally surpassed pre-pandemic levels, and the state saw its first population increase in years in 2024. The Lake Charles MSA, while still recovering from significant employment losses since 2020, is showing signs of resilience, particularly in manufacturing, healthcare, and hospitality. The area has also seen two straight years of population growth, each faster than the state as a whole. Taxable sales, exports, and gaming revenues have remained at high levels. Combining these into a coincident economic index points to a gradual recovery and a new upward trend.




Housing activity should be on the rise as a flurry of multi-unit building permits that were obtained last year should have construction in progress, if not yet completed.





Looking ahead, there is much road to travel as there have been overall drops in the labor force but the region's economic trajectory is optimistic, driven by billions of dollars in energy investments and infrastructure projects, and a renewed focus on quality of life and workforce development. Statistical models point to slight growth in most parishes and a continued flat trajectory for the area as a whole. But incorporating just a few economic development projects shows that employment growth could dramatically increase.

The CES/SAE measures are derived from a survey of businesses while LAUS figures come from a survey of households that become part of a BLS formula/model to derive the household employment statistics.
